The Miracle of Hope House

When Mahboba Rawi visited a village of tents in Kabul and saw the desperation there, she began to pray to God for help and her prayers were answered. Now we need help to make more miracles happen.

'hen Mahboba Rawi visited Kabul in July 2003 she saw hundreds of refugees living in a slum city of tents on the side of the road and she stopped to talk with the families living there. They had no running water, no electricity, no food, no work, and no hope. Children were sick and filthy and covered in sores; people hadn't bathed for weeks; and children were sent to beg for scraps or forage on the city's dumps. One father of seven children who had lost one arm and hence could not work, was almost demented with sorrow. Mahboba said she had never seen so many desperate people. The tents had relief organisations' insignia on them, but these people were getting no help whatsoever from anyone.

So desperate was the situation that Mahboba realised she had to do something. When she explained the situation to several NGO representatives she knew, she was introduced to a high-ranking Government minister and given a building rent-free for a year to house the tent dwellers. This building is brand-new, has hot water and electricity and is a miraculous improvement on the slums in which the tent-dwelling Afghanis currently live.

But Mahboba still needs to transport these people to the building she has called Hope House. There are roughly 2,000 people living in the tent slums and they need clothes, bedding, schooling, household utensils ... there is an enormous job ahead to get these people going again. With uncle Haji on the ground in Kabul, Mahboba's Promise is doing what it can as quickly as possible before Afghanistan's winter settles in and freezes people to death.

With your help – and more miracles! – we wish to make full use of Hope House. We need financial support so we can:

- Transport families to Hope House
- Set up basic facilities, including food, furniture and clothing
- Provide heating
- Pay a refuge coordinator
- Provide books, computers, teachers and rudimentary education
- Maintain ongoing facilities

Life Changing:

An outsider's point of view about humanitarian work in a war-torn country

Filmmaker Gary Caganoff recently visited Kabul to make a documentary about the Afghani way of life. He visited and stayed with uncle Haji of Mahboba's Promise and witnessed the building of a new children's home in Kabul, thanks to money sent from Australia. This is an excerpt of a letter he sent Mahboba's Promise on his return two months later to his home in the Blue Mountains, NSW:

Her stories about the aftermath of that other war we've "won" – the 2001 Coalition assault on Afghanistan that ousted the Taliban – leave you with one of two options. To get angry or to get active. It's one thing to read dispassionate balance-sheet accounts of how Afghanistan is faring two years after the American-led action, but quite another to grapple with just how timorous, how unambitious the West has been about reversing the fortunes of the 23 million Afghan population.⁴¹

Sister School

Australian schools are invited to sponsor a sister school in Afghanistan and help other children become better educated. The project involves sponsoring costs of a chosen Afghan school for a negotiable period of time. Sydney schools are asked to volunteer a target amount over a period of preferably one to two years costs to cover the of maintenance, teacher salaries, school fees, or equipment and resources. Schools also have the option of collecting second-hand goods and sending them directly to Afghanistan. There are different options for schools with different budgets. In return schools will receive an information letter about the Afghan school. The program is flexible and Mahboba's Promise encourages each school to consider how best it can help its Afghani counterparts, considering its own funds and resources. To help schools communicate what children overseas have in terms of "education", Mahboba Rawi is available to speak at school assemblies to launch the program.
